

Arbor Day Bookmark Grade: K-2



Purpose: Students will create a bookmark to celebrate Arbor Day.

Background: In 1970, Arbor Day was officially recognized nationwide thanks to President Richard Nixon. Arbor in Latin means "tree". This day is a celebration of planting, caring for, and preserving trees. In the United States, it is celebrated on the last Friday in April.

Florida Forestry Facts: (2017 Statistics):

- Florida's forest industry contributes \$25 billion to the state's economy.
- Florida's forest industry helps provide more than 124,000 jobs.
- 17 million acres of forestland cover almost half of Florida's total land area.
- Almost 2/3 of the forestland is privately owned.
- Ten counties are economically dependent on the forest industry.

Materials per student: strip of cardstock paper: 5½" x 8½", pencil, crayons or colored pencils, optional: use stickers - apples, oranges, acorns, flowers, leaves, etc.

Activity:

- 1. Observe trees in nature.
- 2. Pass out materials to each student.
- 3. Students place their hand, wrist, and part of their arm on the cardstock, so it covers most of the paper. Trace with a pencil. This represents the tree trunk and branches.
- 4. Color the tree trunk and branches brown.
- 5. Use crayons, colored pencils, or stickers to decorate the tree with native leaves, fruits, or flowers.
- 6. Write "Arbor Day" and the year on the bookmark.
